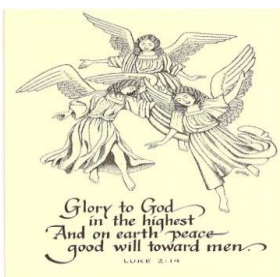
Dear Friends and neighbours,

PARISH PLAN REVIEW

The open meeting to discuss this in November was very sparsely attended. Some suggest that this was because, as set up, the meeting could have been rather boring (the writer accepts some responsibility for this) whilst others say that it was a sign of general satisfaction with the way the Parish Plan has been implemented and used as a reference point to date and with the proposed changes.

Certainly some of the more specific of the original objectives, such as the establishment of allotments and a website and the arrival of superfast broadband, have been achieved. Looking ahead many of the objectives now are about degree - continuing to strive for better public transport, trying to remain up to date as communication technology advances, making sure that the improvement in roads and pavements is maintained, etc - rather than outright change. One exception to this is the commitment to try to establish some sort of modern alternative to the traditional youth club.

The review is officially complete and the document will be posted on the website shortly, with hard copies available for those who want them. It is unlikely that a further five years will then elapse before another formal exercise. With pressure on planning and local authority budgets, and the advent of Neighbourhood Plans, the parish council even more than before needs to monitor the wider world continually and always to be ready for change.

CLERK TO THE PARISH COUNCIL

It was with deep regret that the parish council learnt that James McKechnie, the parish clerk, had decided to resign as his other responsibilities meant that he was unable to continue. Although he had been with us for a relatively short time he had shown himself to be hardworking and efficient and it is to his credit that he felt to continue to serve as Wilbarston's clerk might mean a fall from the high standard he had set. James has agreed to carry on while the council seeks a replacement. Many readers will have seen one of the advertisements. A NEW PARISH COUNCILLOR

Since the election in May the parish council has been one short of its full complement of eight. At its meeting in November Georgina Royle was co-opted to fill that vacancy and we are delighted to welcome her to the role.

PARISH BUDGET

The parish agreed a for 2016/17.



COUNCIL 2016/17

The council has draft budget for 2016/17. If unaltered at its December meeting this will require a sum of £6,870 to be raised by precept through council tax, an increase of £400 over the current year. Alongside some minor adjustments the principal increase is £300 to cover ongoing website costs - hosting, maintenance, etc. - which in order to provide a step change in our ability to communicate within the parish and with the world outside is thought to be an acceptable expense.

There is a proviso that if we recruit a new parish clerk, who has not yet completed the usual professional training, there may be one off expenses to help with the cost of this. If necessary this will be discussed in December and amended details circulated.

GIGACLEAR

The parish council understands that Gigaclear, the superfast broadband provider, is about to start work on installation in the village, and may have done so by the time you are reading this.



At the moment the intention is to locate the box at the back of the green although details of this and the necessary works to cable, etc are currently under discussion. Details will be publicised as they become available. Inevitably there will be some disruption but overall it must be a good thing that two superfast broadband providers will be competing in the village.

COMMUNICATIONS UPDATE

As it is some time since I, as the parish councillor responsible for the Chronicle, formally thanked all those who regularly contribute items for the newsletter. I should like to express my thanks again now. I would also like to thank Janet Mackintosh for producing the Chronicle in its final form; something she does cheerfully and efficiently.

Over the years, some thirty two in my case, there have been many changes in the production of the Chronicle from the early cut and paste to the electronic movement of material at the touch of a button. The parish council now has a website and there is a council sub-committee set up to look at communication within the village. If anyone has views on this please do let me or any other of the

councillors know. The more replies we get the better.

The Poppy Appeal this year raised £1438: A good result. Thank you everyone from Wilbarston and Stoke Albany who contributed.

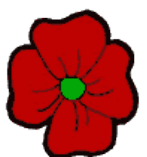

STOKE ALBANY AND WILBARSTON BONFIRE 2015



After a very wet morning that soaked the bonfire building crew thankfully the rain stopped at lunchtime and there were even glimmers of blue sky to accompany the firework set up. An unseasonably mild evening stayed dry and helped to encourage a very large crowd to watch the bonfire lighting and fireworks. There were many positive comments about this year's display – with several people commenting that it was the best they had seen – we even had two written thank-you notes which were lovely to receive. It is always good to have feedback so that we can try to incorporate improvements next year. Not everyone may be aware that the event is entirely funded from the generous donations you place in the collecting buckets together with the profits from the hot dogs, raffle, toffee apple and light rope sales. Thanks to everyone that attended and in turn helped to enable us to plan for the 2016 event. As a self-organised village event it is a significant undertaking and the current committee is looking to expand the number of people involved in helping. It is a fun activity to be involved with. There are a surprisingly large number of things to do to stage an event like this. The intention is that responsibility for each of these is handed out so as to make the event overall easier to run. The tasks involved are:

- Collecting pallets for the fire in the week prior, building the bonfire on the Saturday morning and supervising the playing fields to avoid any unwanted dumping
- Buying, cooking and serving hot dogs and serving teas and coffees
- Bucket rattling for those all-important donations and selling light ropes
- Collecting raffle prizes, selling raffle tickets and organising the pumpkin and guy competitions
- Setting up and providing the PA and music
- Marshalling / health and safety
- Litter picking Carlton Road, the playing fields and firework area on the Sunday morning along with clearing the bonfire of any non-combustible material on the Sunday and clearing the whole site the following weekend

Not to mention ordering, laying out and lighting the fireworks, as well as erecting the safety fencing and handing out the free sparklers.

The Care Scheme was the brain child of the late Sheila Mellalieu of Stock Albany. Serving as the president of the local W.I. way back in 1982 she entered and won a competition organised by Barclay Bank for ideas on how to help one's local community. With a small group

of volunteer drivers and her prize of £50.00 which formed the basis of the fund the Scheme was up and running. Drivers received a car allowance and the service was free to anyone needing transport to keep an appointment at the hospital, the doctors the dentist or optician's who did not have their own transport. For a trip to Desborough or Corby the driver received 75p, to Kettering Hospital £1.50; donations have always been very appreciated. Needless to say the rates have risen somewhat since those early beginnings. I was a driver myself for the first 18 years so I do realise the value of this service especially to the older members of our villages.

Anyone reading this who feels they would like to become a volunteer I am sure Jeremy Burrell would be most pleased to hear from you. It would only be a once in a while commitment.

WILBARSTON VILLAGE HALL

Over the last few months the Village Hall Committee has been aware that the hall could benefit from insulation and heating improvements. To this end, Mike Doyle took on the task of identifying issues and put together an Eco Refit Project. In order to fund this it was obvious that we would need grants to carry out the work and Mike has worked tirelessly to obtain these. To date he has secured the following funding on behalf of the hall:

£1250.00 from the Maud Elkington Trust

£5000.00 from Kettering Borough Council Community Fund

£6490.00 from Awards for All (Lottery funding)

There were no restrictions on the Maud Elkington grant or the Kettering Borough Council grant which can be used for ongoing improvements, but the Awards for All grant is specifically for the installation of roof fans and loft insulation. We were originally granted £6000 from British Gas Energy Efficiency fund for upgrading our lighting to LED but unfortunately they have told us that they have "run out of money" for this year but we will be one of the first in line for the new year funding – watch this space!!

We have also applied to the Mick George Community Fund for c.£20,000 but this could take some months before we get a decision. If granted, this would be used to insulate the walls on the inside of the building. This fund has been generous to us in the past allowing us to complete works to the outside tiling on the building so hopefully we will again be successful.

The roof fans have already been installed and will hopefully improve the heating circulation by deflecting heat downwards that would normally be lost in the roof space. The insulation work is due to be carried out on December 10th/11th so by Winter we would hope to see a considerable improvement in the retention of heat in the hall.

The Committee would like to thank Mike for all his hard work and also the organisations which have given us grant funding for the project.

The Social Committee, Diane Alter, Judith Farr, Linda Whitehead and their band of willing helpers continue to raise funding to benefit the hall furnishing and decoration and have so far this year raised over £1500. Thanks go to them for all their hard work.

Village Hall Bin – Whilst the recycling bins are there for all to use, the rubbish bin is purely for the use of the Village Hall and is marked to this effect. PLEASE do not put your rubbish in this bin as we have now gone to a 2-weekly collection to save money and are finding that we do not have room for our own waste because others are using it for their own purposes.

Dog Fouling – There is concern over the number of dogs using the field as a toilet facility and although the Parish Council are addressing this, it is still happening. This is not necessarily villagers, who are allowing their dogs to do this, as witnesses have seen people coming in cars and letting their dogs out. If you see people doing this we would be grateful if you would remind them that there is a dog bin for use at the hall.

There have been changes to the organisations using the hall on a regular basis. Unfortunately, due to lack of numbers, both the Guides and Market Harborough Canine Society have ceased using the hall. However, the Canine Club has been replaced with members who previously used the hall and are now called "Wilbarston Ringcraft" so if you want to join in, just call in on a Tuesday evening and see what they do. The Mums and Tots group are also struggling to keep numbers up so again, if you want to call in on a Monday morning from 9am to 12noon with your little one, please do so. They are a friendly group and there are lots of toys and games to keep the young ones entertained whilst you enjoy a chat and a coffee.

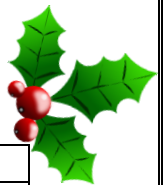
WILBARSTON VILLAGE SHOP & PO
